

### Pastor Daren: A More Detailed Look at Upcoming Worship Options

In last month's newsletter, I mentioned our worship services were becoming a buffet of options—liken to a former family favorite: Furr's Cafeteria. Furr's Cafeteria was great because my whole family could find dishes that they liked. For me, it was usually a combination of chicken-fried steak, mashed potatoes, and some sort of pie. I remember my mother would always say that I had to choose a vegetable. I then pointed at the mashed potatoes and added some corn to my tray. She seemed unconvinced, and she said I had to eat something green. I, of course, pointed at the green Jell-O.

As we enter November and into Advent, I hope that you will try the worship options that seem best for you and your family. I'm not sure what will be your chicken-fried steak, or your piece of warmed pie a la mode—or even your green vegetable, but I pray that you will find something that feeds you.

The first weeks in November feature only online Sunday services. Hopefully, you have tried this option of watching the Sunday service on YouTube by clicking the video link on the church website (<a href="http://www.immanlutheran.org">http://www.immanlutheran.org</a>). This worship option might be considered a bread-and-butter option that you can always choose, even if you are away, or sick, or trying to avoid being sick. In some ways, it looks and feels the most like "normal" church where you don't have to wear masks, and you can join the worship with full voice. To get a bulletin, either click on the website link for a digital bulletin or ask Denise in the church office (970-352-3003 or <a href="mailto:office@immanlutheran.org">office@immanlutheran.org</a>) to put you on a list to receive a paper bulletin each week.

Starting in Advent, which begins November 29th, two additional worship options become available: inside worship in the sanctuary and outside worship in the parking lot. These service options are variations on what you have done in the past but are also quite different. If you are expecting the same chicken-fried steak you've always enjoyed, then be prepared for a worship service that is similar but not the same. My advice would be to think of this as new menu items that will take time for you to adjust.

Inside worship will feel a lot like going to a buffet (or a weird wedding). You will park your car and wait in a socially-distanced line to get into the church with the doors opening around 10:15 am and the service beginning at 10:30 am. Like a buffet, there will be a host (greeter) who will sign you in and ask you to wait to be seated by an usher. At this point, you may feel like you are going to a wedding, except everyone is wearing a mask and a heavy winter coat. You also can't sing or talk loudly, and you are seated in a way where it appears there has been a terrible family feud—and no one is talking to each other inside the church. Yet, you will be together, which is the main point of any wedding: being public witnesses to the love of God in our lives. You will be able to hear the organ first-hand, hum along with a wonderful cantor, and be communally fed through communion already set up in your pews. The pews where you will be seated are marked with beautiful quilt pieces on each side, and communion cup/wafers are set within the wooden hymnal holders. During communion, you will reach out and take the cup/wafer,


partake of the bread and juice, and then set the used cup back into the wooden tray. An Usher will dismiss you at the end of the service. Having listened to the experiences of other worshipping communities who have recently begun to worship inside, it feels pretty odd in those first weeks, but, like everything in this time, people learn to adapt.

Outside worship, similar to our very last "Praise in the Parking Lot" worship service, will involve listening to the worship service through your vehicle's radio. Using your radio, you can tune to a specific radio channel and listen to the sound broadcast from the indoor worship service. This worship option has its advantages because you can turn up the volume as loud as you need and can loudly sing/talk without masks. This worship opportunity is best for those who would like a safer option than going inside the church but still want to see and worship with folks as well as take communion. On a Sunday morning, you would park your vehicle, tune your radio to the selected station number and wait for someone to come and bring you a bulletin and the communion cup/wafer. You might have to wave so that people know your vehicle is occupied! At some point, we will try to create a way for the parking lot worshippers to see what is going on inside. We are working on beefing up the WIFI in the church and parking lot so people can watch the same video of the service inside that folks are enjoying online at home. One advantage of the parking lot worship is that you can make your vehicle as warm as you want--unlike the inside worship, which has fresh air constantly being brought in and moved through the sanctuary so that any virus doesn't build up and make people sick. We will try to warm the air inside the church as much as we can but be sure to bring your jacket and even a blanket.

To be honest, it will all feel quite strange at first. Like a good class at the beginning of the school year, things will be strict early on so that we may safely move through these months making adjustments and working to avoid people getting sick. We will continue to create safe spaces for worshipping and building community, but it will be up to each of us to keep us all well. Thankfully, we follow the one who teaches about true love for the sake of the other. It is in such a love that we see Christ in our midst and a Holy Spirit that fills our congregation anew.

God bless you as we prepare for the upcoming Advent season of light and hope!

We are now donating the layettes to local organizations.


We buy the flannel at the "Black Friday Sale".


