Pastor Daren: Opening Up and Opening Out. Where do we go from here?

Years from now, we will look back at this time in disbelief and wonder: disbelief that we could be caught in the grip of a virus that has crossed every border, and over time will infect everyone on the planet; wonder that we have in an unprecedented time, developed vaccines designed to teach our body's immune system how to fight this virus and its variants.

Almost as miraculous, thousands of churches across the world have adapted and even thrived as they have modified worship services and offered access to communal online worship. Last week, I was on a Zoom meeting of pastors discussing how we might move toward changes in our worship with the astounding success of vaccines in tamping down virus outbreaks. In a nutshell: What do we do in this in-between time before our young people have full access to the vaccines? What changes in this year do we reverse and what changes do we keep?

There are habits that we ache to come back in terms of our worship and fellowship together. There is a hunger to be more physically connected whether through communion at the altar, a hug at the door, or the sharing of Christ's peace. The desire for physical touch varies from person to person with some relieved that they didn't have to share the peace, to those who wonder how they've lasted so long without a good hug.

Then, there is singing. Ironically, singing has been one of the most dangerous activities of the pandemic as it sends the virus out in contagious, virus-filled aerosols. With our three worship options of inside, outside, and online, we've had a mixture of opportunities to sing as loud as we want in our pickup truck or our home, while those inside the sanctuary have joined in humming or simply listening. Again, depending upon who you are, singing out loud may or may not be a big deal.

One of the items that church leaders have been talking about is the profound consequences of worshipping online, and in particular, distributing communion as a virtual act beyond the boundaries of church walls. Suddenly, those who aren't able to make it to church due to poor health, frustration over a hearing loss, illness, travel, or moving to another state—are now able to worship with their beloved community. For many congregations, online participation has grown the numbers of worshippers, givers, and members to the point that it is inconceivable of going "off-line."

Learning from this pandemic, one reality is evident: Over time, everyone on earth will be exposed to this virus and their bodies will have to fight it, vaccinated or not. The question is not will we get Covid, but when, how severe, and what will the long-term health effects be? The vaccines from Pfizer and Moderna are 95% effective and are successfully being tested on younger people. Like the school-ready vaccines children receive for mumps, measles, chickenpox, etc., Covid vaccines will become a standard part of essential healthcare. Unlike many previous vaccines, Pfizer and Moderna are not disabled or weak versions of a virus, but simply vaccines that teach our body to make a protein that mimics the shape of the virus so that our bodies create immunities without any exposure to a real virus. When we inevitably get the virus, the vaccine assures us that we will have a significantly lesser version of Covid.


With the hundreds of millions of vaccines successfully given throughout the world, this is a God-send. If you love the people around you, please ask them to consider vaccinating themselves and their children so that they may not face the capricious and sometimes permanent effects of Covid-19 such as blood clots, respiratory problems, and even death. With the variants of Covid continuing to emerge and spread throughout the world, vaccination boosters will likely become an inevitable part of our standard healthcare.

At a personal level, I received the Pfizer vaccination at the Sunrise Healthcare Center in Greeley. I had little to no effects with the first shot and was a bit achy and feverish after my second shot for about half a day. Others have experienced something similar from feeling slightly tired to feeling out of it for perhaps a few days—but nothing like Covid symptoms and its potential life-long effects. I share this experience because I know some folks are fearful about the vaccinations or consider them unnecessary or unnatural. Let me simply share with great love that you will feel unbelievable freedom and sense of peace after being vaccinated. Knowing that you and the people around you are profoundly safer is priceless.

Frankly, the wide use of vaccination among our congregation is what will return us to a more normal sense of worship and fellowship. Until our youth are vaccinated and a higher percentage of the general adult population is vaccinated, we will need to take varying measures to keep people safe—and depending upon local outbreaks we will wisely adapt social-distancing measures and masking if necessary. If you are feeling overly tired or off, maybe you should consider wearing a mask or using the online or outside worship options. If you are sick, stay home and watch the service online. If you've been exposed to someone sick, consider others before you hug or shake their hand. This is not just common sense, it is loving and caring about people beyond our inconvenience or sense of embarrassment. It is Christ-like and profoundly Christian.

You have been gracious and loving as we've navigated this past year with Covid. Thank you! As we discuss options for opening up our worship and opening out our hearts to the Greeley community in mission to our neighborhood and beyond, let us stay focused on who Christ is in our lives and where God is leading us.

GIA Clothing Bank

Several Greeley-area churches are sponsors for and help operate the Greeley Interfaith Assn. Clothing Bank, located at 228 N. 9th Avenue in Greeley. The hours open are 10:00 a.m.—2:00 p.m. on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays (and some Saturdays). The Clothing Bank accepts gently used items of clothing and then sells them to the public at a reasonable cost. Proceeds of the sales cover operating expenses and then go toward community scholarships.

MEDIA POSITION IMMANUEL LUTHERAN CHURCH

- We are looking for...
- o Someone to help in the video recording of services and the updating of the church website to enable access to those services.
- Training:
- o The Media person will be trained by Pastor Daren with website work gradually transitioned to them.
- Responsibilities:
- o Record worship services through the video camera and live-streaming through the computer.
 - Set up the video camera and be prepared to live-stream at least 15 minutes before the service.
- o Regularly update the worship service links on the website.
 - Create the video and bulletin links for each service a few days before the service is live-streamed and recorded.
 - Upload the recorded version of the video to YouTube and change the corresponding link on the website sometime after the service (preferably by that evening).
- o Help with sound as needed.
- Commitment and Compensation:
- o Training and supervision will be provided by Pastor Daren.
- o Time required approximately four (4) hours per service, which includes the worship service and website work during the week.
- o Compensation will be \$60 per service.





This is a ministry of prayer and love for those in need. Prayer shawls are usually given in a time of transition in life, illness, emotional or spiritual upheaval, or for a time of celebration like birth or a marriage. The shawl serves as a tangible reminder to each person that they are covered in God's love each time they wear the shawl.

Prayer Shawls have their origin in the Old Testament. In Biblical times, the Jewish men wore the prayer shawl at all times, not just at prayer. Prayers shawls have been made informally and silently for centuries. As it is being made, the maker will offer prayers asking God to bless and comfort whoever will receive the shawl. Most prayer shawls will incorporate the number 3, to represent the Trinity.

This ministry is intensely private and prayerful, a gift of love and concern. They are universal, they comfort and enfold, they wrap and warm, they shelter and beautify. Those who receive a shawl and those who make a shawl are loved and blessed. But most important are the prayers that go with it. Prayers to let the recipient know that someone on earth cares for

them and that God is always there.




